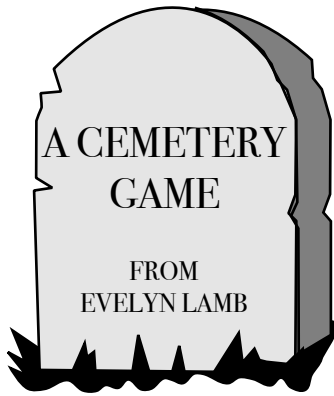


Memento Mori
